




COLONEL DANIEL Y. MORRIS
Deputy Director of Army Safety



Colonel Daniel Y. Morris was commissioned a distinguished military graduate through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps in 1994 at North Georgia College and State University, Dahlonega, Ga.

COL Morris assumed duties as deputy director of Army Safety in June 2016. He began his career at Fort Rucker, Ala., where he completed the Aviation Officer Basic Course and Initial Entry Rotary Wing Course. He was then stationed at Fort Hood, Texas, where he served as a forward arming and refueling point platoon leader, troop executive officer, assistant S-4, company executive officer and assistant S-2.

Following completion of the Aviation Captains Career Course and Combined Arms and Services Staff School, COL Morris was assigned to the 1-228th Aviation Regiment, Soto Cano Air Base, Honduras, as lead aviation planner for counterdrug operations under Joint Task Force - Bravo.

COL Morris then held multiple positions in Hawaii, including time as S-3 air officer, 2nd Brigade, 25th Infantry Division; assistant S-3, 25th Combat Aviation Brigade; company commander, G Company, 58th Aviation Regiment (ATS); and headquarters and headquarters company rear detachment commander, 25th CAB. He then deployed to Kabul, Afghanistan, where he served as senior combat services support advisor at Kabul Military Training Center, mentor to the Afghan Army's Wing G3, and executive officer to the deputy commanding general, Afghan National Army Training Command, under Combined Security Transition Command-Afghanistan. After returning from deployment, COL Morris spent time as chief, G3 Training, 94th Army Air and Missile Defense Command, Fort Shafter.

COL Morris was then assigned to Fort Leavenworth, Kan., where he was operations officer at the Center for Army Lessons Learned and completed Command and General Staff College in May 2009. He was then assigned to the 10th Special Forces Group (Airborne), Fort Carson, Colo., where he served as group aviation officer and deployed to Iraq as director, Joint Operations Center, Combined Joint Special Operations Task Force - Arabian Peninsula, and various locations such as Mali and Uganda.

In June 2012, COL Morris returned to Fort Rucker as executive officer, Army Air Traffic Services Command, and from April 2013 to March 2015, he commanded 1st Battalion, 58th Aviation Regiment, Airfield Operations Battalion. Upon successful completion of battalion command, COL Morris was selected as airspace branch chief, U.S. Army Aeronautical Services Agency, where he served until assignment to the Pentagon as deputy DASAF.

COL Morris is married and has two children.
